## **QuaverHealth Scope of Federal Requirements**

- » Developmentally, linguistically, and culturally appropriate
- » Each screen went through a DEI review by a member of the QuaverEd DEI Committee
- Trauma-informed
  - » Each "sensitive topic" reviewed by a LMSW with a specialty in Trauma and Poverty
  - » Lindsey conducted a trauma review and flagged any triggering information (Lindsey Ed.S. in Mental Health in Schools)
- Can be used for implementation of school and community-based mental health programs
  - » Just like other Quaver curricula, users will be able to create custom lessons to meet the format and group size most appropriate for use in a variety of settings.

## Technical assistance to local communities
